

New Student Leadership Team at St. Louis

These prestigious posts are the result of the students, initially, being elected as a Senior Prefect during Year 13 by both peers and teachers. 




'Red Carpet' Style at the St. Louis Formal

St Louis Goes To Italy



On Monday 10th October 2024, a band of intrepid adventurers departed St Louis, Kilkeel, and headed off on their inaugural 'Sun' trip to Italy. The first visit of the trip was to La Fabbrica della Pasta di Gragnano - Pasta Factory, where the touring party learnt all about the origins of 'Naples' pasta, had a tour of the production factory, tasted the pasta in its raw form, and visited the museum. The group then had time to purchase some of the wonderful produce of the factory and fill their cases with different homemade pastas. The group then made their way along the beautiful coast to their Hotel in Piano Di Sorrento where the group were greeted with fresh homemade pizza outside in the fabulous Italian sun!

During the trip, the group were lucky enough to tour the amazing Amalfi coast, taking in the breath-taking views and stopping along the way at famous photo spots for once-in-a-life-time snaps, even 'celeb spotting' in Positano. The morning was then spent in Amalfi town where we visited Cathedral of Sant' Andrea before sampling the world famous lemon sorbet, served inside a full lemon. The group then departed on the Amalfi ferry to Salerno to make their way back for a pizza making workshop. During the workshop the group learnt about the history of the dough, the correct size of an 'Italian' pizza and that when it comes to toppings, less is more! The evenings were spent at the local beach, in the warm seas, on the Bay of Naples.



Student Successes Recognised at Senior Prizegiving

At the Senior Prizegiving, Principal, Mr Kevin Martin, welcomed current senior pupils as well as past pupils to recognise their achievements in the 2023-24 academic year and reflected on how St Louis has, "For generations, prepared students for the future." Mr Martin acknowledged the calibre of St Louis students saying, "Students are considerate towards others and very willing to help those in greater need, the spirit of service is alive and well in St Louis."

Past pupil and guest speaker, Geraldine Foley, was then introduced. Geraldine has lived a fascinating life, sailing over 180,000 miles and visiting over 40 countries around the globe and living for decades on board

her boat along with her partner, Peter, who she met at university.

Geraldine spoke glowingly of her days in St Louis and how the nuns, at the time, inspired her and the other girls to go out and give of their very best. She recalled, "From the nuns, there was always the encouragement to go that extra mile ... I just took it a bit more literally than they intended." Geraldine praised former staff member, Mrs Anley, as being the person who inspired her to get into sailing as she brought students to Killowen to take to the water. "I was very quickly hooked on everything to do with sailing and revelled in the challenge of learning to harness the wind." She studied law at UCD but, "A month after graduation I set sail from Carlingford for what might now be considered a gap year—except it lasted for thirty years."

With everyone hooked on Geraldine's story, she told of some of her adventures, but her focus was always on delivering a passionate message to those assembled. She concluded, "Aim high, and if you have a passion go for it, you'll only regret what you don't do! Go on, harness the wind, follow your dreams."







Past Pupil, Declan Curran, Encourages Students to Persevere in Speech at Junior Prizegiving

St Louis Junior Prize giving was held this week with past pupil, Declan Curran, returning as guest speaker. The event was opened by Head Girl and Head Boy, Emma Quinn and Shane Quinn, who were followed by the school Trad group.

Principal, Mr Kevin Martin, congratulated all the award winners and emphasised how the educational experience at St Louis is one that, "educates the whole person, going beyond the academic side, which is so important, by realising that there are many other aspects to life which are also very important." He cited the wide ranging extra curricular offerings that are available in the school and the opportunities pupils get to go on trips, attend talks and workshops, and immerse themselves in the community while studying in St Louis.

Guest speaker, Declan, then came to the stage and offered the students lots of brilliant advice, and his key messages were to have no regrets and to build resilience. "Don't fear rejection, embrace it. If I told you that you were twenty rejections away from achieving something massive, you'd fly through the twenty to reach it, don't let rejection stop you," said Declan, citing his own most recent film, 'Dear Imelda' as an example. The acclaimed short film has made it into four film festivals - but only after being turned down by 32. Declan encouraged the students to be ambitious and adopt a "what's the worst that can happen?" approach when opportunities arise. No matter how ambitious something may seem, "the worst that can happen if you reach out to contact someone is they say no or don't reply and then you're no worse off than if you didn't contact them." said Declan.

Declan recalled with much fondness his time at St Louis, where his love of film began, and reminded all the students of the importance of working hard and being dedicated to your studies. He recounted some of his memories of the six enjoyable years he spent in St Louis, the friendships he formed in his time at the school, and how the caring, positive ethos of the school shaped and formed him as he moved into adult life.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon where some of the achievements of students over the course of the academic year were recognised, and everybody left the hall feeling inspired following the words of wisdom from the speakers.


St. Louis Students Star on the Sports Fields of Ulster
